Back to School Safety Reminder

The 2015-16 school year is right around the corner. The Stayton Police Department, in partnership with the North Santiam School District, is dedicated to making the Stayton community a safe place for our youth to travel to and from school. This endeavor is the responsibility of everyone who shares our roads, crosswalks, and bike lanes.

For drivers, please be aware and alert for children who may be walking to and from school. Children tend to become distracted and may walk into the roadway without looking for vehicles.

Parents, please take the time prior to the start of the school year to talk to your children about their route to school and the importance of listening to school staff monitoring crosswalks.



Members of the North Santiam School District will be in the area wearing safety vests, helping children use the crosswalks before and after school. Furthermore, the Stayton Police Department will have an enhanced presence in the school zones during school hours, ensuring drivers and children alike are being safe.

Drivers who are distracted by mobile devices and failing to stop for pedestrians in crosswalks will be subject to enforcement of the current traffic laws.

Both the North Santiam School District and the Stayton Police Department take the responsibility of protecting our children seriously and encourage you to contact us if you have any questions or concerns.

Crazy Eights Author Tour: An Accidental Oregon Idea

The "Crazy Eights Author Tour," founded in 2012, will hit the road this fall for its second edition. Oregon author Byron Wright said the idea came to him while on a road trip doing research for his next novel. Wright had been considering ways to stimulate more interest in Oregon's writing and publishing communities by connecting them with readers, booksellers and libraries in an invigorating new way.

He tested the waters with fellow writers, the Pacific Northwest Booksellers Association, and a selection of local bookstores and received an enthusiastic response. Once the idea jelled, he was able to interest 28 of Oregon's award winning authors, eight independent bookstores, and a number of libraries to participate in an author tour that would bring eight authors at a time to eight separate venues across the state from mid-September to mid-November. "The tour is totally volunteer," says Wright, "The generosity of the authors is what makes the tour work. They are passionate about supporting independent bookstores, libraries, and our communities of readers."

Local libraries will host each of the 2015 Crazy Eights Author Tour events. The fifth leg of the tour will be held in Stayton on Thursday, October 22, 7:00 p.m., hosted by the Stayton Public Library. The Friends of the Library Used Bookstore will serve as the event's book vendor.

The event format will be something akin to speed dating, only with authors. Each author will have eight minutes to address the audience about their life as a writer and introduce a featured book. It will be a fast-paced literary slam. A mixer will follow the eight rapid-fire presentations where authors will interact one-on-one with members of the audience to discuss their work and personally sign books.
